

Journal of Veterinary Andrology, is an international scientific journal published by the Centro de Estudios Superiores e Investigación en Ciencias del Agro (CESICA) in Venezuela, which receives reviews, original research articles and clinical cases, covering the different aspects of reproductive health of males of different animal species. Papers may be written in Spanish or English and should be sent to the Editor in chief to the email address jvetandrology@gmail.com accompanied by a letter signed by all authors or by the responsible author, which in turn will be the author who will be sent all correspondence, letter must to include a declaration that all authors have approved the manuscript and the sending to be considered in the Journal of Veterinary Andrology, as well as that there are no conflicts of interest.

General features

1. The authors are responsible for all the information embodied in manuscripts.
2. Papers submitted for publication in Journal of Veterinary Andrology must be original and must not have been previously published nor have been sent simultaneously for publication elsewhere.
3. The paper must be written in Microsoft Word, on letter-size pages with 2 cm for all margins. Manuscripts should not exceed 20 pages.
4. The letter Arial size 12 should be used continuously without formatting.
5. The line spacing should be double and lines should be numbered in the left margin of each page continuously, including the list of references. All pages should be numbered in the lower right corner.
6. Units of measurement must be used according to the international system of units.
7. The use of abbreviations and symbols should be avoided, unless the standard measurement units are used. Abbreviations used, must be defined when first mentioned in the text.
8. If English is used to draft the manuscript, this should be standard American English and spelling check is recommended through the Merriam-Webster Dictionary (<http://www.mw.com/>). The authors whose native language is not English should review the drafting of the manuscript with an expert in the language.

Format

Title page: must be the first page and this must to include: paper title, this should be as short as possible, maximum 85 characters, and must to inform the reader in an unequivocal way the content of the paper and the species studied; the names of authors, use superscript numbers after author name to indicate their affiliations, and a superscript asterisk to indicate the corresponding author, indicating the email and postal address. Additionally, a short title with a maximum of 46 characters, including spaces, must be included to be used as running head.

Abstract: should be one paragraph and not exceed 300 words, and must indicate clearly the objectives and main conclusions of the paper or review, methods used and summarize the results and conclusions. Should be free of references and abbreviations. If paper is written in English a translation of the abstract to Spanish, will be included by the Editorial board.

Keywords: Immediately after the abstract, provide a maximum of 6 keywords, avoiding general and plural terms and multiple concepts. These keywords will be used for indexing purposes.

Introduction: this should give a background and should set the study in context by reviewing the relevant and current knowledge of the subject and explain the objectives of the study.

Materials and Methods: This section should provide detailed information about the materials and methods used to carry out the study, including experimental design, information on animals used and statistical analysis. Reference should be made to studies where the methods or techniques used are published and detailing if any modification were made. Must include the source of chemicals, hormones, reagents used, indicating the manufacturer's name and location (city and country) where they were manufactured in parentheses. Specify the composition of buffers, culture media and solutions used, and the information of the equipment used.

Results: should present the research findings, should be written in past tense and separately from the discussion.

Discussion: this section should answer the objectives of the study, comparing the results with those of other publications either similar or contrary and as objectively as possible and minimizing speculation explain or interpret the possible reasons that led to obtain the results.

Conclusions: this section should highlight the most significant findings of the study and the importance or implications of these.

Acknowledgements: should be as short as possible, and in this section a mention of financial support should be made.

References: all references cited in the text must be included in the reference list and vice versa. Unpublished work (personal communications, manuscripts in preparation or submitted but not yet accepted for publication) must be cited in the text, giving the full list of authors and the date (Suarez A, Vilchez R., 2015, unpublished observations; Williams G., 2012, personal communication) but not in the list of references. Articles accepted for publication but not published yet must be listed as "in press" including the Digital Object Identifier (DOI). The use of electronic references is not permitted unless they are published in journals or books. In the text, cites must follow this examples: single author, Evenson, 2012; two authors, Sakkas & Alvarez, 2010; for three or more authors, Simões et al., 2013. When there are several citations, list them in chronological order (Sakkas & Álvarez, 2010; Evenson, 2012; Simões et al., 2013). When several cites from the same author and the same year, add letters a, b, c, etc., then of the year, and in the order in which they are cited in the text. In the list, references must be included in alphabetic order, following this format: authors surnames followed by initials, year of publication, complete title of the article or chapter in the case of a book, complete name of the journal or book (in bold), volume and issue number, surnames and initials of editors and place of publication in the case of book, and first and last page numbers of article or chapter. Follow these examples:

Articles in journals:

Proceedings:

Kolle S. 2015. Transport, Distribution and Elimination of Mammalian Sperm Following Natural Mating and Insemination. In: Proceedings of the 19th Annual Conference of the European Society for Domestic Animal Reproduction (ESDAR). **Reproduction in Domestic Animals** 50(S3):2-6.

Tables: must be concise, identified with Arabic numerals and numbered in the order they appear in the text, the title should be at the top and should be concise and include the animal species studied, identify concisely the rows and columns, do not use color or shading, do not use internal verticals or horizontal lines. Use footnotes to provide information to facilitate the understanding of the table and explain abbreviations. They should be placed on separate sheets after the reference list.

Figures: include images and graphics. They should be identified with Arabic numerals and be numbered in the order they appear in the text. Must include a legend at the bottom, including the number given to the figure, the species, key to the symbols used, and the names of statistical tests and probability level used for comparisons. In the case of images, mention given magnification. They should be placed on separate sheets after the list of references and tables.

Review process

Manuscripts received will be initially evaluated by the editor to verify compliance with established rules and if so they will be subject to a review process by at least two experts by the method of double-blind body. Once reviewed, the manuscript will be returned to the authors for final editing according to comments from reviewers. Authors should return the items edited within a maximum period of 15 days, accompanied by a communication justifying each observation made by reviewers and highlighting the changes made in the text. If written in English, accepted manuscripts will be subject to editorial review process by the editorial board before they are sent to the authors for final approval. Articles that do not meet the standards will be returned to their authors.
